



1. Dolmain an Bhaile Chaoil

Ballykeel Portal Tomb (Dolmen)

The Neolithic burial site dated between 4000 and 2500 BC has a huge capstone supported on upright stones over an octagonal burial chamber. It is known as the 'Hag's Chair'.

2. Tuama Cúirte Bhaile Mhic Dhiarmada

Ballymacdermott Court Tomb

The monument is an extremely well preserved Neolithic burial site with three chambers. It can be dated between 4000 and 2500 BC.

3. Carn Chluian Lom

Clonlum Cairn

This is an unusual megalithic monument thought to date from the end of the Neolithic period (4000 to 2500 BC). It consists of an irregular burial chamber, once covered by a massive capstone, set within a 12.5m long irregular cairn.

4. Tuama Cúirte Chluainte Gabhra

Clontygora Court Tomb

Towering stones, 2.7m high, mark the entrance to the Neolithic burial site. It is known as the 'King's Ring' and can be dated between 4000 and 2500 BC.

5. Na Doirse

The Dorsey

Dating from the Iron Age period around 100 BC, the enclosure comprises two roughly parallel massive earth bank and ditch ramparts over a mile long. It lies astride an old route way to Eamhain Macha (Navan Fort), the ancient capital of Ulster near Armagh.

6. Sean - Séipéal Chill Shléibhe

Killevy Old Church

Killevy is the site of one of Ireland's most important early convents, founded by St Moninna in the 5th Century. The earliest of two churches on the site dates from the 10th Century.

7. Gallán Chill na Sagart

Kilnasaggart Pillar Stone

A long Irish inscription on the Kilnasaggart Pillar Stone records the dedication of the place by Ternoc, son of Ceran Bec under the patronage of Peter the Apostle. The inscription can be dated to around AD 700, making it the earliest cross-carved stone in Ireland.

8. Caisleán na Maighre

Moyry Castle

In 1601 Lord Mountjoy built a three storey castle on a rocky hillock overlooking the Gap of the North in order to secure the area for the Crown.

9. Carn Shliabh gCuilinn Theas agus Tuama Pasáiste

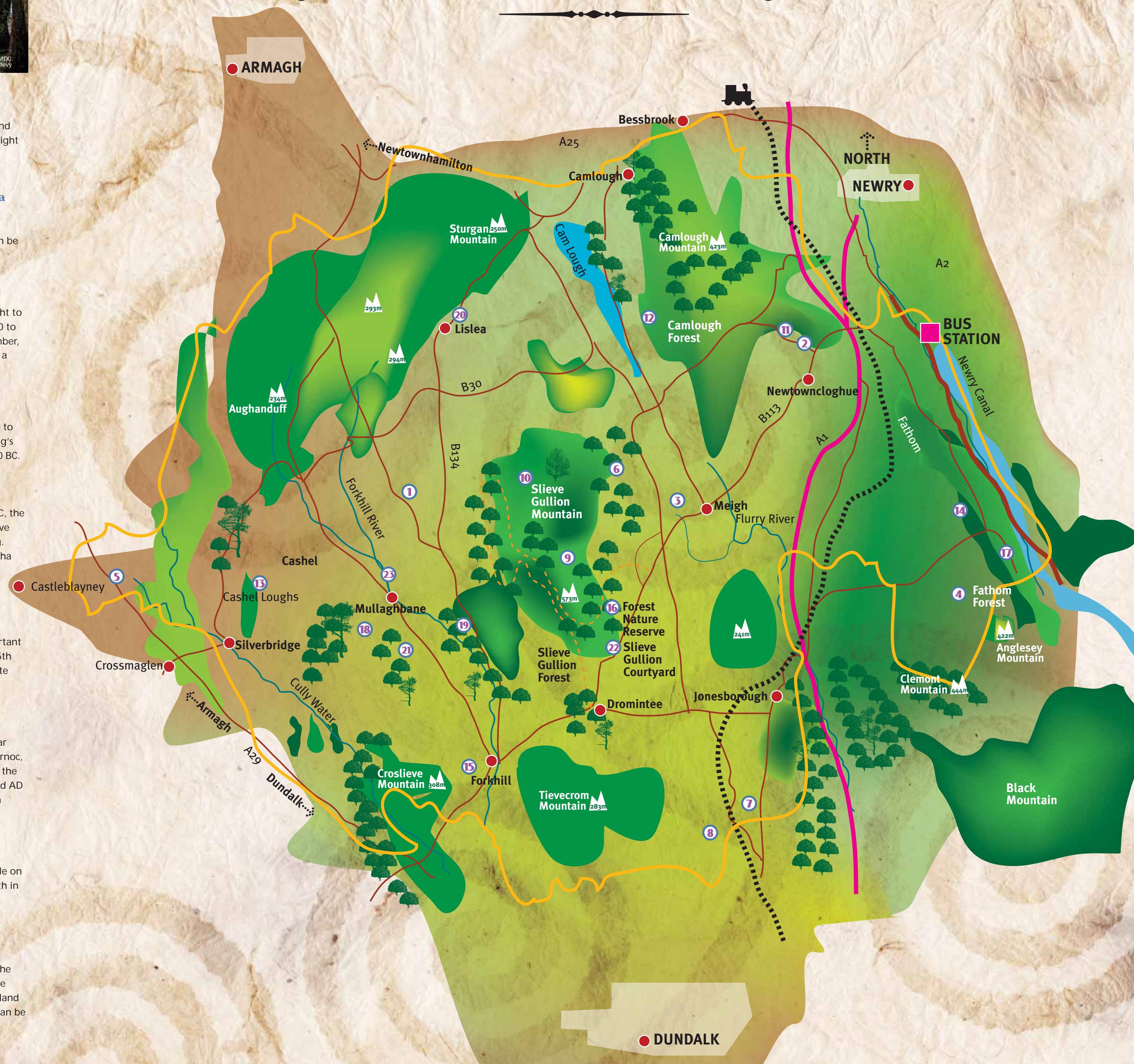
Slieve Gullion South Cairn and Passage Grave

The 573m high south summit and cairn marks the highest point in Co. Armagh. It is the site of the highest surviving Neolithic passage grave in Ireland dating back to between 4000 and 2500 BC. It can be entered from beneath the summit.

10. Carn Shliabh gCuilinn Thuaidh

Slieve Gullion North Cairn

On the north summit of the mountain is a multiple cist cairn dating to the Bronze Age (2500 to 1500 BC).
